#### What School Counselors Do

- ✓ Provide direct counseling to students individually and in support groups.
- Deliver classroom developmental lessons.
- ✓ Provide education, information and support services to parents.
- ✓ Offer consultation services to teachers.
- ✓ Facilitate referrals to community support services.
- Advise students on academic planning.
- ✓ Work with students on high school admissions process.
- Maintain resources on high school options.
- ✓ Work with school personnel to identify areas for staff development and student workshops.
- Serve on school and community committees to address student issues.
- Examine data to uncover achievement and opportunity gaps and collaborate on intervention designs.


Our **VISION** is of a school counseling program that is based on the belief that:
