Dear Computer School Families,

Reading is an essential part of learning. In addition to supporting student growth throughout the year, reading helps us find our shared human experiences and broadens our worlds. As author Malorie Blackman reminds us, "Reading is an exercise in empathy; an exercise in walking in someone else's shoes for a while." This summer, students will examine new worlds and develop empathy by reading three books: *A Long Walk to Water* by Linda Sue Park, and two other books of their choice.


During the first days of school, students will engage in making connections to our 2021-2022 school-wide theme of *Empowerment*. Below are the steps to complete the Summer Reading Assignment.

1. All Community Read - A Long Walk to Water by Linda Sue Park

We ask that *all* members of The Computer School community—students, parents/guardians, families, teachers and staff—read this young adult book that centers around the theme of empowerment.

- **2. Choice Books:** Students must read at least TWO other books of their choice (see recommendations below).
- **3. Creative Response**: Students choose ONE of three options listed at the end of this letter to reflect on and respond to ONE of the three books they read. This assignment must be completed and presented on the first day of school.





A Long Walk to Water by Linda Sue Park

A Long Walk to Water begins as two stories, told in alternating sections, about a girl in Sudan in 2008 and a boy in Sudan in 1985. The girl, Nya, is fetching water from a pond that is two hours' walk from her home: she makes two trips to the pond every day. The boy, Salva, becomes one of the "lost boys" of Sudan, refugees who cover the African continent on foot as they search for their families and for a safe place to stay. Enduring every hardship from loneliness to attack by armed rebels to contact with killer lions and crocodiles, Salva is a survivor, and his story goes on to intersect with Nya's in an astonishing and moving way.
